Librarian's Corner



What is Open Access?

As we begin an academic research project, one of the very first, and most essential, steps we undertake is a review of the

literature—an exploration of what other scholars have investigated and written about our subject. We do this by searching for books (broader in scope) and journal articles (more narrowly focused). Decades ago, we used the library's card catalog, or printed indexes to journals in our field of study. Today, we use online databases. Until relatively recently, most of those commercially controlled databases were inaccessible without a password generated by the university or a public library—and many of them still are.

But scholars and academics began to realize that access to information was severely hampered by these restrictions, and the concept of Open Access was created. Now we have many databases that are open and available to all, including people with no institutional affiliation, thus making these resources easy to access. Open Access journals provide availability on the Internet, permitting any user to read, download, copy, distribute, print, or link to the full text. There are thousands of peer-reviewed, Open Access journals out there, with new titles emerging rapidly.

I encourage you to explore these resources. On our GMU website, go to GMU Classroom and click on GMU Library. There you'll find a list of recommended Open Access resources, with links to their websites. Among them: Open Access Digital Theological Library, WorldCat, DTL (Digital Theological Library), Google Scholar, Internet Archive, Theological Commons, and more.
